MAY 24-27: SASKATOON PUBLIC SCHOOLS: BRIGHTWATER FOOD FOREST

The Brightwater Food Forest is located at the Brightwater Ecoscience and Indigenous Learning Centre south of the city along Beaver Creek. Students from Saskatoon Public Schools have been working for four years on this project while learning about food security, ecosystems, and sustainability. This year will be our last major planting session as we complete our eco-buffer shelter belt and add raspberry canes throughout the project.
