Congratulations

Dr. Robert (Bob) Bors — As Head of the Fruit Program, Plant Sciences Department, University of Saskatchewan was inducted into the Saskatchewan Agricultural Hall of Fame in January, Dr. Bors has successfully introduced nine sour cherry and 10 haskap varieties and has supported the commercialization of cherries and haskaps across Canada. His fruit plants are grown by home gardeners and commercial fruit producers across Canada, the United States and Europe. He also maintains the Prairie Fruit Genebank, initiated with help from the Agricultural Development Fund, to preserve the germplasm of prairie fruit plants.



Dutch Elm Disease Reminder

Help protect our beautiful elm trees and historic canopies by:

- 1. Not storing or burning elm wood
- 2. Disposing of elm wood at the Saskatoon Landfill (it's free for residential loads!)
- 3. Never pruning elms during the April 1 August 31 ban
- 4. If you spot unhealthy elms or suspicious wood, report it by submitting a photo online: https://www.saskatoon.ca/services-residents/housing-property/city-owned-trees/tree-diseases-pests/dutch-elm-disease#dedform
